On January 1, 2010, the Association for the Blind & Visually Impaired, Lehigh County, and Visual Impairment & Blindness Services, Northampton and Monroe Counties, consolidated operations. The Annual Report 2009-2010 reflects consolidated client and customer services statistics and other important information as they were recorded on June 30, 2010. During this year of "Celebrating One Vision," Center for Vision Loss touched the lives of 17,820 people with the following four areas of **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES**

1 The Center for Vision Loss is the region's only non-profit agency dedicated to improving the lives of people affected by severe vision loss. Often this loss of vision is accompanied by many emotions and uncertainties – How will I get to the doctor, do my banking, go grocery shopping or live in my own home if I can't see well? The agency offers a wide variety of **CLIENT SERVICES** to help restore each person's independence and quality of life to the greatest extent possible. These services include education, direct support services such as reading mail and writing checks, door-through-door Escorted Transportation to essential appointments, referrals for Orientation and Mobility and Vision Rehabilitation Therapy and support and activity groups.

2 Low vision is the sight that remains after a person's vision can no longer be corrected. In the **LOW VISION CLINIC**, Anthony Silvetti, DO, our low vision specialist, conducts a special exam to evaluate the level of the customer's remaining vision and asks them how they wish to use their remaining sight. Based on their answers, the doctor will suggest various kinds of adaptive technology that can maximize independent functioning. Aids such as video magnifiers, TV glasses, sun lenses, hand-held magnifiers and other devices are often helpful to restore functional ability in a variety of ways. Many of these devices can be purchased in the agency's low vision aids shop.

LOW VISION CLINIC: 175 Customers

3 Individuals who are un/underinsured often cannot afford to make corrected vision a priority in their lives – their limited funds must be used to buy food, pay the rent or mortgage, or seek critical medical attention. Kristen Roseman, OD oversees the agency's two **EYE CARE CLINICS** which provide top quality, low cost eye exams and glasses for children and adults who are low income or have no health care insurance or vision coverage.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention states that vision disability is the single most prevalent disabling condition among children.

4 COMMUNITY OUTREACH extends the agency's Prevention of Blindness activities to all residents of our communities. VISION SCREENINGS conducted at pre-schools, day care centers and schools help identify eye problems in children as soon as possible. Adults are also screened at health fairs and other community venues. The agency is a member of the St. Luke's Partnership for a Healthy Community: Vision Initiative. EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATIONS about eye health and eye safety are offered for business and community groups, at health fairs and other locations.
